Look at the instrument diagram opposite and learn the names of the different parts. The vertical lines are the four strings. The horizontal lines are the frets. The thick horizontal line at the top is the nut.


The notes are made by pressing the strings down behind the frets with the fingers of the left hand; this is called "stopping" the strings. Sometimes it is not necessary to "stop" a string and the note is made by the nut; this is called an "open" string.

On the next page you will find diagrams like this, but the strings to be "stopped" are marked. When we strike right across the four strings with the right hand fingers or felt plectrum, we sound a combination of notes known as a chord. With only three finger "shapes" we can produce the chords which will accompany hundreds of beautiful folk tunes.

Get to know your Columbian uke and it will be a good friend to you. Remember it is a fine musical instrument and is worthy of care. It will stand more abuse than most instruments as it can be cleaned with ordinary soop and water, but don't expose it to extreme heat or drop it an the floor.



UNLY THREE SHA



We give each chord a letter name and you will see that the diagram shape above has been named "O". Follow the diagram: part your third finger (left hand) behind the third fret of the first string. Now strum right across the four strings with your thumb or with the felt plectrum. The felt plectrum is held tightly between the thumb and index finger with the point downwards to strike the strings.

APES TU LEARN



Here is the next chord. First (index) finger behind the first fret of the second string; second finger behind the second fret of the fourth string. The first and third string are "open". Strum across all flow. Easy? But perhaps your chord sounded a little muffled? The trick is to square the fingers at the first ploint so that the TIP only makes the pressure; if you don't finger cleanly the ball of the finger will foul the next string.



Now for a really rich sound! This time we use three fingers but you'll find they "lie" easily. Third finger, second fret, first string: first finger, first fret, second string; second finger, second firet, third string. Fourth string "open". Strum across all four.

+ CHECK YOUR TUNING !

Tune third string tight enough for good tone. Stop third string at fourth fret and tune second string to this sound. Stop second string at fifth fret and tune first string to this sound. Stop second string at third fret and tune fourth string to this sound.
